Human Rights –

1. Human Rights Kit – This kit contains a guidebook, a video and 29 booklets featuring the United Nations’ 30 Human Rights.

Bullying –

2. The *Bully* Project Kit – Based on the award-winning 2011 documentary *Bully*, this kit features two versions of the documentary (the original and one for younger audiences), a guide for the film, project ideas, and a flashdrive featuring information and lessons that meet common core standards.
3. *Starting Small: Teaching Tolerance in Preschool and the Early Grades** - A film and teacher’s guide that includes classroom activities, teacher insights and resource guide to help teach our youngest students about equity, cooperation and citizenship for a lifetime.
4. *Stop Bullying Now!* Video Toolkit – This toolkit features 12 webisodes for children ages 9-13, 2 webisodes for children ages 5-8, discussion questions, workshops and public service announcements.
5. *Stop Bullying* – A flashdrive containing Tip sheets in English and Spanish and ready-to-print posters.
6. *Bullied** - A 38-minute documentary about Jaime Nabozny’s struggle with bullying and his fight to gain rights for all students.
7. *Bullying Experiences* – Resources from Sacramento State University for all grade levels.

The Fight for Rights –

8. Japanese Internment –
 - a. *Stand Up for Justice: The Ralph Lazo Story* – This kit has a 33-minute film about a Los Angeles Mexican-American student who witnessed Japanese Internment and became the only non-spouse, non-Japanese American who voluntarily relocated to a Japanese

Internment Camp. The kit also has a teacher's guide with lesson ideas and placards you can use around your classroom.

9. African American Civil Rights Movement –
 - a. *The Children's March** – A 40-minute film and teacher's guide about the children marches that occurred in Birmingham, Alabama in 1963.
 - b. *Selma: The Bridge to the Ballot** - A 40-minute film and teacher's guide about the push for Voting Rights in 1965.
 - c. *A Time for Justice: America's Civil Rights Movement** - A 38-minute film, teacher's guide and timeline featuring the push for civil rights in Montgomery, Little Rock, Birmingham, and Selma.
10. Cesar Chavez and the UFW –
 - a. *Viva La Causa** - A 38-minute film and teacher's guide featuring the story of the UFW's struggle to gain rights for its Filipino and Hispanic migrant farmworkers.
11. LGBTQ –
 - a. *George* – An upper-grade/middle-school level book depicting the story of a young transgender girl.
 - b. *A Face in the Crowd – Expressions of Gay Life in America* – A coffee table book by the Matthew Shepard Foundation featuring the triumphs and challenges of the LGBTQ community.
12. Asian-Americans –
 - a. *Vietnamese in Orange County* – A picture book featuring the history and lives of the Orange County Vietnamese community.
